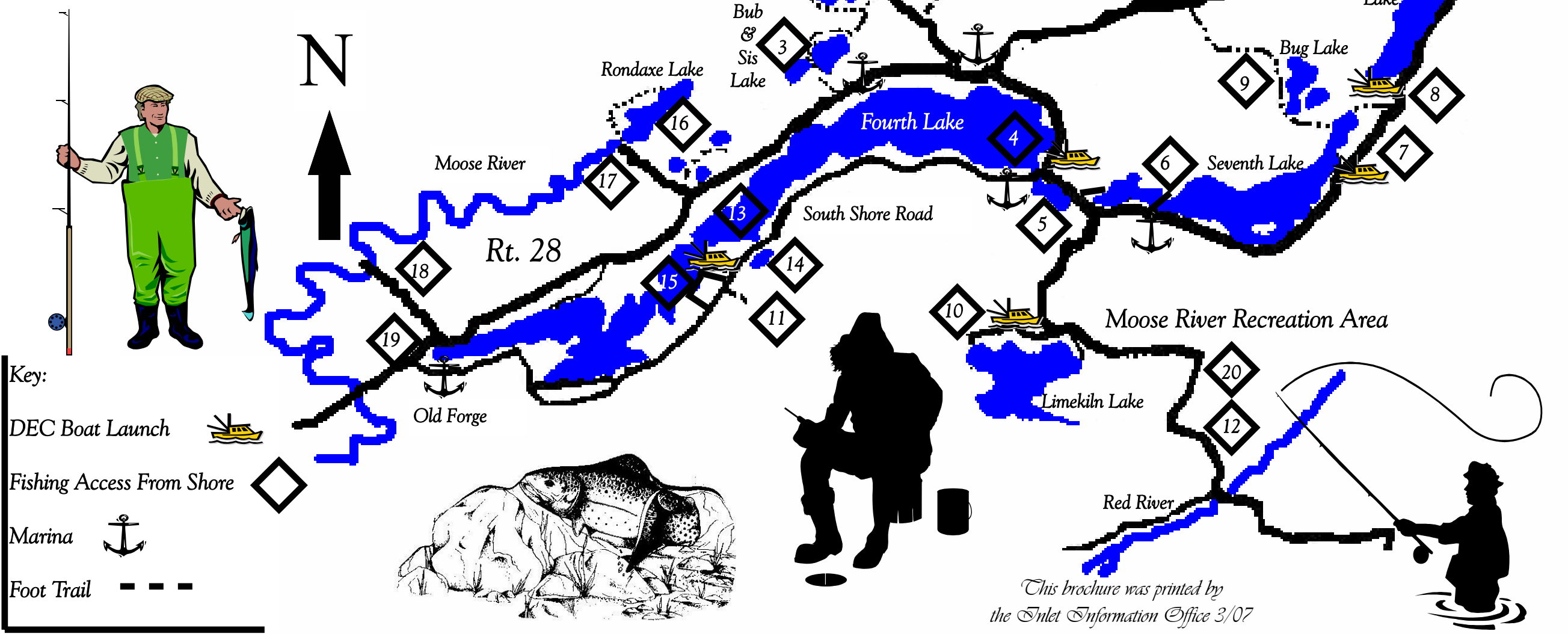

In addition, the use or possession of baitfish is prohibited on all lands, lakes, ponds and streams in the following areas: Town of Inlet – Bug Lake, Eagle's Nest Pond, High Rock Pond, Icehouse Pond. Lost Ponds (3), Mitchell Ponds (2). Town of Webb – Bear Lake, Bubb Lake, Brewer Lake, Buck Lake, Buck Pond, Moss Lake, Nicks Lake, Big Otter Lake, Quiver Pond, Razorback Pond, Sis Lake, Tied Lake, Twitchell Lake, West Pond, Woods Lake.

Inlet Area Fishing Map and Guide



1. Moss Lake

Located off the Big Moose Road, this lake has many places to fish from shore, which are all just a short walk in from the DEC trailhead and parking lot. This is a wonderful spot and a short carry for a canoe, as well.

2. Cascade Lake

Located off the Big Moose Road, this hike in to Cascade offers four or five well-hidden locations to fish along the footpath surrounding the shore. With a bit of determination you can find the perfect spot for bobber and worm casting.

3. Bubb and Sis Lake

Access to these ponds can be made quickly from Route 28 just outside of Eagle Bay. Several campsites along the shore offer the perfect getaway for the angler wanting native Brook Trout.

4. The Boardwalk in Arrowhead Park-Fourth Lake

Located in Downtown Inlet, Arrowhead Park offers both pier and channel casting. Many people use this for sightseeing recreation, so cast with caution.

5. The Sixth Lake Dam

Located just north of Downtown Inlet on the Sixth Lake Road. The dam seems to be the haunt of Rainbow Trout at certain times of the year. This dam offers a nice spot for fishing of any type, with room for many anglers.

6. Sixth & Seventh Lake Bridge

Located between Sixth & Seventh Lakes on the Seventh Lake Road. The bridge offers a nice spot for a bobber floating with the current. The bridge is very narrow, caution with traffic must be considered.

7. The Seventh Lake Boat Launch (Buck Hollow)

A nice parking area and sandy beach are the features that allow for a sleepy afternoon of fishing from the many open areas along the point.

8. Eighth Lake Campground

The fishing from the lakefront sites in Eighth Lake Campground has always been good. This spot allows access to both Seventh and Eighth Lakes. A nice short fishing dock extends into Seventh Lake

and in the evenings the fishing is better.

9. Bug Lake and Eagle Nest

Accessed from a trailhead parking lot in the Eighth Lake Campground, these two are a medium hike away from fishing for Kokanee Salmon and native Lake Trout. Fishing from shore is better from the far point on Bug Lake near an open primitive campsite.

10. Limekiln Lake Campground

You can fish from any of the lakefront sites as well as from the public boat launch. Splake, Brown Trout, Sunfish, Bullhead and Perch are available for the smaller anglers.

11. Third Lake Creek

To access this Creek take South Shore Road to Third Lake Creek Trailhead parking. There is a trailhead to the left just beyond the Lot. It is a seldom used path and may be tough going, but the winding creek along the trail will be worth the time. Native Brook Trout abound in these shallow waters. The shore is very spongy and wet so caution must be used when fishing.

12. Red River

Located 5 miles into the Moose River Recreation Area, off of Limekiln Road, this slow moving, "perfect Adirondack wilderness" river is full of native fish and has easy fishing locations for any angler. The shoreline around the bridge is open and sandy. The rest of the river can be fished with waders or by using deer trails to get to the shoreline edges. Thousands of untouched pools await.

13. Alger Island Campsite

Access can be made by boat only. A good spot is from the Third Lake Boat Launch; off the South Shore Road. Fishing from the island should be done only by registered campers. In the winter the ice pack to the south East of the island offers some of the finest tip-up ice fishing in the North Country. Ice should be tested before walking on.

14. Quiver Pond

This "pull off and fish by the roadside" pond has been the favorite for parents starting the little tikes fishing, and does yield some very nice fish for the adults as well.

15. Third Lake & Fourth Lake Boat Launch Access

The shores of this large picnic area offer some feed weed beds for cruising Northern Pike, Tiger muskie, Perch, & Sunfish.

16. Carry Pond & Fly Pond

These Two ponds are located on a foot trail off of the Rondaxe Road. Finding good casting room may be difficult, but the amount of fishing done here is very little and therefore the fish are very plentiful.

17. The Bridge across the Moose River at the outlet of Rondaxe Lake

The area around this bridge is the favorite spot of old time fishermen. Off the beaten path, it gives many open sandy areas for casting.

18. Bridges and crossings of the north branch of the Moose River

The Moose River, on the Old Forge Mountain. Bike trails off North Street in Old Forge offer hundreds of spots for calm water fishing. Clear water and sandy weed beds are home to a variety of species.

19. The Green Bridge in Thendara

Located on the south side of Route 28, the Green Bridge and Lock and Dam picnic area offer 15 to 20 nice fishing locations for fishermen of all ages.

20. The Ponds and Streams of the Moose River Recreation Area

This 66,000-acre primitive camping area offers the best of Adirondack waters with native species fishing in the most spectacular remote settings. Although it is suggested that you fish these waters from a lightweight canoe most can be fished from the shore with careful casting.
